DID YOU KNOW...

■ The River Spey is the fastest flowing river in Scotland and for centuries has shaped the landscape and character of Moray.

■ The timber was used to meet the high demand for railway construction. Later it was used for shipbuilding - over 500 vessels were launched where the river meets the sea at Kingston and Garmouth.
